

What is news media bias?

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News media bias

When assumptions or opinions favoring one side (or interpretation) of an issue or event skew <u>news reporting</u> in a way that is unfair or distorting.



The term "objectivity" can distort our understanding

- Objectivity in journalism is an aspirational ideal, a concept that much of the public may not understand.
- The public may believe that the media holds itself up as having already realized objectivity, when in fact journalists know it is a constant pursuit.
- Thinking of the aspiration to be both **fair and accurate** is a more useful frame for understanding news bias.
- This helps us work away from a binary approach to the subject (objective/biased) and toward a critical approach (less biased/more biased).

Our own biases affect how we perceive bias in news reports

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Often questions are leading or possibly cynical

Where is the bias?

What does this "media message" want you to feel?

Who benefits from this?

What is the intent behind this news report?

Is there a hidden meaning behind this?

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Essential questions for a careful and deliberate approach to news media bias

Guiding questions for news media bias

- What counts as "news media bias" and who decides?
- Is most bias in news overt/intentional or perceived/incidental?
- Can our perceptions of bias be reliable?
- If someone says bias is left-leaning or right-leaning, what is the "center" and who decides?
- Is all bias partisan?

- Before discussing bias, you must remember the question: "Is this meant to inform or persuade me?"



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
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Media bias charts can be helpful but have limitations


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Limitations of media bias charts



- Focus is almost exclusively on political bias and often reflect the orientation of opinion and commentary, not news.
- Inquiry models that are debatable, not definitive ratings.
- Heavily influenced by perception.
- Can reinforce unconscious biases.

Limitations of media bias charts



- Tend to imply false equivalence between high-quality, standardsbased news orgs and overtly partisan or problematic sources.
- Suggest that most newsrooms have a systematic ideological goal or orientation.

We need to move from a left/right, liberal/conservative binary to recognizing types and forms of biases on a spectrum of less or more biased.

Partisan bias

A type of bias in which a journalist's political views affect news coverage.

Corporate bias



A type of bias in which the business or advertising interests of a news outlet, or its parent company, influence how — or even whether — a story is reported.

Demographic bias

A type of bias in which race, gender, ethnicity or other factors — such as culture or economic class — affect news coverage.

"Big story" bias



A type of bias in which journalists' perceptions of an event or development as a major, important story can cause them to miss key details and misrepresent key facts.

Neutrality bias

A type of bias in which a journalist or news outlet tries so hard to avoid appearing biased that the coverage actually misrepresents the facts.

The above types of bias can take any number of

FORMS

Framing

The way that journalists approach and organize a story, which can affect what it emphasizes.



Story selection The process that news outlets use to decide which issues and

use to decide which issues and events to cover.

Flawed sourcing

A straight news report that neglects to include all of the people, organizations, documents and other providers of information that are needed to make the reporting accurate, fair and comprehensive.

Absence of fairness and balance

The failure of a straight news report to present all relevant viewpoints on an event or issue in an accurate, impartial way. Tone



The use of words and phrases that affect the audience's perception of the issue or event being covered.
