Constitution Day and Voter Education Week in the Era of AI and Deepfakes

Artificial intelligence technology is not new, but dramatic advances in generative AI have captured the world's attention and are transforming the information landscape. Harmful falsehoods are designed to cause confusion and to undermine people's faith in American democracy. Election disinformation can be tricky, but the same false narratives and claims tend to get recycled, which can make it easier to spot. We will share strategies for helping determine the credibility of evidence and sources as well as best practices for teaching about misinformation.
